

Economic Impact of Urban Trail Networks

The **Atlanta BeltLine** has generated a direct economic impact of nearly \$4.6 billion dollars in private development as of the end of 2018. This is seven times greater than the total public and private investment of \$559 million to date invested in trail construction and private real estate.






Economic Impact of Urban Trail Networks

The Laffite Greenway in New Orleans has spurred more than \$100 million in public and private projects adjacent to the short 4-mile trail connecting downtown to City Park.



Economic Impact of Urban Trail Networks

The Indy Cultural Trail in downtown Indianapolis has led to more than \$1 Billion in new assessed property values within one block of the trail network. Additionally trail visitors spend on average \$53 dollars per day in local businesses along the trail.

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
Other Impacts: Job Access

The Greenway directly touches 75+ neighborhoods and is 1/2 mile or less from more than 50% of Baltimore's neighborhoods

The Greenway connects to the City's largest job centers including:

- Port of Baltimore









Other Impacts: Improved Health

- The Greenway will increase access to active transportation facilities and key recreation destinations.
- Active transportation options can help lower Baltimore's high rate of cardiovascular diseases and asthma.




Other Impacts: Improved Equity

- The Greenway serves a diverse range of communities and neighborhoods.
- The Greenway will connect neighborhoods of low opportunity (low property values, low incomes, low vehicle access and severe public health impacts) to neighborhoods of high opportunity.
- The Greenway will enable connection to the regional trail network, ultimately connecting Baltimore City to the County, Annapolis, Columbia, BWI and destinations in between.






WESTPORT WATERFRONT SHARED-USE PATH

As the Westport waterfront property develops, creating a shared-use path through the site will be included. The shared-use path traverses the Westport waterfront between Clare Street and Middle Branch Park. This shared-use path provides a safer, more relaxing alternative route to the current Gwynns Falls Trail alignment on Kloman Street.
